


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# The Prestige (Valancourt 20th Century Classics)



## Synopsis

In the smoke-and-mirrors world of Victorian music halls, two talented young stage magicians vie to be known as the best illusionist in London. Each of them performs a masterful and seemingly impossible illusion, and each is determined to unravel the secret of his rival's trick at any cost. But what starts out as professional jealousy soon escalates into a bitter and deadly obsession whose terrible consequences will still be felt a century later by their descendants, who have their own surprising reasons for wanting to discover the truth. One of Christopher Priest's most acclaimed works and winner of both the James Tait Black Memorial Prize and the World Fantasy Award, *The Prestige* is an ingeniously constructed entertainment, a masterpiece of misdirection where nothing is what it seems. Readers who have seen the 2006 film adaptation directed by Christopher Nolan will find that though the book shares many similarities with the movie, it also contains many surprises, as well as a chilling ending that the reader will never see coming. There are many similarities between the book and the movie, but it is difficult to compare the two.

On the whole, they share a similar concept of feuding magicians, but are complete opposites in delivery and later plot elements. It is quite interesting to see opposing sides to different narratives, each one casting the light in a different direction, but the ending is simply atrocious. The reason I say that is because the book just ends, right when things are picking up pace and tension. It sounds odd saying that an ending can ruin the scenes that came before it, but, in this case, it left the book feeling inconsequential. As a reader, I just needed more closure.
