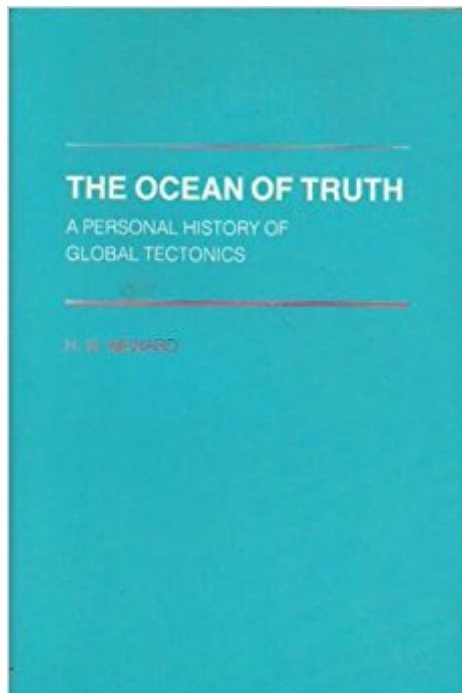




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The Ocean Of Truth: A Personal History Of Global Tectonics (Princeton Legacy Library)

This is a fantastic book by a brilliant scientist, H.W. Menard, one of the leading lights of the "heroic age" of marine geology after World War II, and whose discoveries, along with those of Maurice Ewing, Bruce Heezen, and many others, led to the sudden acceptance of "continental drift" by a very conservative American scientific establishment in the late 60s. The Ocean of Truth must therefore be read by anyone interested in geology and global tectonics. Menard, unlike many modern geologists, who are rather close-minded when it comes to unorthodox ideas, was genuinely open-minded and curious his entire life. It's a real shame his book is out-of-print, but if you can get your hands on a copy, read it! You will not regret it!
