

This is an excellent overall account of billfish (marlin, swordfish, spearfish and so on). It's a "Wormsloe" book from this publisher, which seems to guarantee quality (I've read several). Ulanski writes clearly and mixes science with culture in a way that informs both. This book discusses billfish biology, life cycle, prey and migration patterns, along with the development of a major sports fishery--with one chapter on billfish fishing tournaments. Swordfish are treated in a separate chapter, because they have long been fished for food, with other species fished largely for the sport. Two literary figures are important, because both had a mania for fishing--Zane Grey and Ernest Hemingway. Both have a lot to do with the development of the billfish sports fishery, which by now involves many thousands of fishers and quite large amount of money as prizes in tournaments. Catch and release prevails now, and apparently if done with care, most of the fish survive. There's some interesting discussion of long-line fishing and how it impacts these fish, primarily swordfish, as well as discussion of currents, water temperatures and currents, with how the fish use these phenomena. I found the best chapters to be 5, on blue marlin (it has a good section on the mechanics of the fish swimming), and 6. on swordfish. The chapter on swordfish also looks at how this animal is endangered.

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
